Two years ago, April was designated nationally as Distracted Driving Awareness Month. Cell phone distracted driving is one of the Council's key initiatives along with workplace safety, off-the-job safety and teen driving because these are the areas where research shows people are most likely to suffer injuries or fatalities. To mark Distracted Driving Awareness Month, the Council will launch the campaign, "How many will it take?" to raise awareness of the thousands who die needlessly each year because people continue to use their cell phones while driving. Touching HEARTS

March will be a difficult month for the Brezitski family of Pennsylvania. They tragically lost their 8-year-old son, Owen, on St. Patrick's Day 2011. Owen carried a music stand in one hand and crisp dollar bill in the other as he walked across a marked crosswalk with his entire family after his sister's band concert. He had just received the dollar from his grandfather for being so well-behaved during the concert. Owen told his family he wanted to go to McDonald's for a Shamrock Shake.

A 17-year-old driver who was shuffling through music on a cell phone while talking with a teen passenger and speeding at least 10 miles over the speed limit, failed to see the group of people crossing the street and didn't even know she had struck Owen. It wasn't until a crowd of people yelled and chased after her that she realized what she had done.

"It's the lost potential that bothers me most," said Karen, almost one year after her son's death. "He was going to be something. He was so loved and talented." Owen's family has created [Owen's Foundation](#) to help remind others to, "Slow down, be alert and save a life!" Their mission is to promote pedestrian, driver and childhood safety as well as raise awareness of the consequences of distracted driving practices.

The Brezitski family also has joined the [HEARTS Network](#) – Honoring Everyone Affected, Rallying The Survivors – which engages families and victims in teen safe driving issues. HEARTS celebrated its first anniversary on Valentine's Day. Many families, including the Brezitskis, have joined the nationwide community of families and victims whose lives have been changed forever because of teen driving-related car crashes. HEARTS Network survivor advocates also share their personal stories, like that of Owen's, in the hope of enacting change. The HEARTS Network is made possible through funding provided by The Allstate Foundation.

This St. Patrick's Day, Owen's Foundation, in conjunction with the National Safety Council, HEARTS Network and the Pennsylvania Teen Safe Driving Coalition, will host a "Launch O' Love" event to honor Owen as well as educate others on the dangers of teen distracted driving. This event will include an environmentally-friendly balloon launch, and attendees will also receive a free Shamrock Shake in honor of Owen's memory. Pennsylvania Rep. Kathy Watson, chairman of the House Transportation Committee's Transportation Safety Subcommittee, will be in attendance.

Legislative Update

Rep. Kathy Watson was instrumental and worked for several years to get the recent H.B. 9 passed in Pennsylvania to strengthen the state's teen driving laws. This bill, signed into law by Governor Corbett in October 2011, took effect in December 2011. This Graduated Driver Licensing law:

- Increased parent supervision during permit phase from 50 to 65 hours, including 10 hours at nighttime and 5 hours during inclement weather
- Upgraded safety belt law enforcement from secondary to primary for those aged 18 and under in front seat and back seat
- Limits number of passengers to one non-family passenger for teen drivers with a junior driver's license (during the first six months they're driving)

Another bill, S.B. 314 sponsored by Sen. Robert Tomlinson, was signed into law by Governor Corbett in November 2011 and will take effect on March 8, 2012. This law bans all drivers from texting with primary enforcement.

The National Safety Council was involved in the passage of these laws through advocacy and by encouraging NSC members in Pennsylvania to share their voice. The Council's [Pennsylvania Teen Safe Driving Coalition](#) – also made possible through The Allstate Foundation – is now educating the public about these new laws so families won't have to face the devastation that the Brezitski's do.

Madison/Dane County Safe Community hosts Rx Overdose Summit

[Safe Communities America](#), a program of the National Safety Council, works with local communities to prevent needless deaths and disabling injuries. According to an NSC study, counties that contain Safe Communities have 9% fewer unintentional deaths than similar counties that are not designated Safe Communities. Madison/Dane County, WI was designated a Safe Community in 2009 and continues its hard work to keep its community safe by tackling head on an alarming trend facing its citizens – prescription drug overdose – which also is on the rise throughout the country.

In Madison, prescription drug overdose has surpassed motor vehicle deaths as the leading cause of unintentional fatalities. Opiate pain medications represent a significant proportion of deaths and non-fatal poisonings. They can be overprescribed and lead to dependence and abuse. Research indicates that prescription opiates are a gateway to heroin use, which is steadily increasing in

Dane County and nationally.

To tackle this rising trend, this Safe Community held a Drug Poisoning Summit: Stop the Overdose Epidemic on Jan. 30, 2012. The summit was attended by 130 community stakeholders including representatives from the insurance industry, medical and dental prescribers, healthcare services, law enforcement, policy makers, educators and other community representatives. The Summit was an important and visible step in Madison's commitment to stop this epidemic in its community.

Madison is one of 19 communities in the United States that have earned the prestigious Safe Communities America designation from the National Safety Council. NSC is the International Certifying Center for the U.S. through the Safe Communities America program, guiding community stakeholders to reduce injuries and promote safety for the residents of their communities.
