What were the results of Initiative 1?

FWFD Rate of Falls as cause for injury, 2015 was estimated at 641.5/100K, a 12 percent reduction compared to 2012. We have not monitored increase/decrease of the other metrics at this time. Whereas this data could be derived from partners, it is not all available at this time.

»No - Why not? (Please explain.) We do see this epidemic in our community. Injuries as a result of accidental overdose are not as easy to attain in numbers as the deaths. Deaths in total are not as high as some other rates of injury. Approximately half of all traumas seen are positive for ETOH and/or other substances. Therefore this issue has been given high priority for reducing injury in our community in combination with a ripe environment nationally and locally.

In 2015, the FWSCC's Drug Overdose Task Force reconvened. At the start of 2015, three drug take back boxes were located within the City of Fort Worth. At the end of fiscal year 2015, only one box remained. This box was contracted for disposal once per month and would quickly fill within less than 5 days. Coalition partners interested in safety of our citizens and environment quickly worked through our coalition network to ensure vital partners in higher education, pharmacy, hospitals, law enforcement, addiction treatment and various city/county and regional departments were at the table. A plan was set forth and by year end 2016, 9 locations for drug drop boxes have been opened within our city's limits in addition to two incinerators allowing for a more cost-effective approach to disposal. Next steps include collaboration with hospice, pharmacies and providers to educate consumers on the location of these boxes and need for disposal of excess and expired medications to prevent injury and deaths related to accidental overdose.
